ABSENTEE NOTIFICATION

If your child is going to be absent from school for any reason please call and/or email the front office with this information.

yancoag-h.admin@det.nsw.edu.au

All absentee information is to be communicated through the front office administration on (02) 6951 1500 or yancoag-h.admin@det.nsw.edu.au in order for your child's absence to be recorded correctly.

Weekend leave is to be in and signed by Wednesday each week. Duty staff are better able to check student numbers when these simple rules are followed.

Office hours are from 8am – 4pm Monday to Friday. After 4pm the phone will be answered by Duty Staff.

When returning your child to school PLEASE remember to sign them back in at the front office during school hours (8am – 3pm) and at the Duty Room outside of school hours (before 8am and after 3pm) or they will be marked absent without explanation.

Where a student is absent from school, a note explaining the absence must be received by the school within **seven** school days. Where a note is not received the absence will be recorded as **Unjustified Leave**. This cannot legally be changed should a note be received after **seven** days. Absences both justified and unjustified are recorded on school reports.

NOTICE TO PARENTS UPDATING DETAILS

Sadly sometimes relationships break down and the court makes orders that change the contact parents can have with their children or the role they play in making decisions about their children's education. These can be Family Court Orders or Apprehended Violence Orders. Parents can also reach agreement about issues such as contact in a parenting plan.

If this happens it is important that you provide the school with a copy of any court orders or plan that could impact on your child's education.

In the absence of any notification to the contrary, the school will assume that both parents continue to retain a shared and equal parental responsibility for their children and should be involved in making any decisions regarding their children's education.

This means the school will recognise that each parent has equal duties, obligations, responsibilities and opportunities in relation to matters involving the school.

If any changes occur in your family relationships which have the potential to impact on the relationship between the school and your family, please advise the school immediately in writing and provide a copy of any court orders that may be obtained. These orders will be stored securely and only accessed by staff who need to see them in order to plan for your children's learning and support and related issues.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Congratulations to the P&C for their running of Gala day and the upgraded barbecues, new marquee and improved front area. The P&C will put out the final run down of the day.

Work continues around the school which at the moment does seem to be never ending. Many of this work, however are long overdue, I thank you for your patience in dealing with the ongoing moves and access issues. The tiling around McCaughey should be completed by the middle of the year. Mutch and Breakwell are in the process of being upgraded with new carpet, paint, blinds and furnishings. This work will hopefully be completed by mid year and all students will be back in their proper dormitories. The next big plan will be a commitment by the department to complete the school with the building of a new girls dormitory rather than the current 25 plus year old, second hand village buildings.


Other planned work for the year include, the finishing of the exclusion fencing, installation of solar powered bore pumps, new roads due to damage caused by trucks during current works, replacement of furniture in dormitories and improving water access to all areas of the schools property.

This has been an extremely unsettled term and I wish to acknowledge that many families are undergoing difficult times. These circumstances do affect your children naturally and the school has offered extra counselling services and support where we can. The school only has a school counsellor appointed 2 days a week which we consider woefully inadequate and I am working with the Principals of both Hurlstone and Farrer to try to get this changed. Any support you could offer in this regard would be appreciated. The school has granted leave to several students who have been caught up in recent circumstances or have had deaths in their families. Any concerns for your child at the school will be addressed as soon as the school is made aware.

I wish everyone a safe and well-earned rest from the term.


If your **contact details have changed** please contact the Front Office, by email, with your new details.

One trailer-load of firewood, valued at \$200, was donated to the Yanco Lions Club who then channeled the funds into the Burrumbuttock Hay Runners, who were delivering feed and domestic supplies to Central Queensland at the time. Another load was donated to the Barellan Country Women's Association who used it as a raffle prize, which raised \$268.70 for those suffering the effects of the drought in the Barellan area. Mrs Quinn and the Ag Faculty kindly donated one ram from the school's annual Ram Sale. This ram raised \$700 towards the SRC's total of \$2,747, including the funds donated to the Lions Club, and the CWA. On the 11th of March 2019, the remaining \$2,277.10 was donated to Buy a Bale concluding the work of the 2018 Student Representative Council. Now the task falls to the SRC of 2019 to carry on supporting those are who suffering in these difficult times of Drought.
